For the first time this year, we started the year with two Key Stage 2 classes. Our younger students are particularly happy about the new junior playground and sensory garden that has been created in the quad area. It is lovely to watch the students making use of the play equipment and sandpit. We are extremely grateful to The Charles Lewis Foundation and Joseph Levy Foundation who were instrumental in enabling us to undertake this transformational project. (See page 18 for photos)

We have been fortunate that a number of parents and other members of the Moor House Community have gone to great lengths to support the work of the School & college this term. We are immensely grateful to all of them for this, as it enhances our ability to support our students in their learning. I hope you enjoy reading all about their fundraising efforts throughout the magazine. Their generosity enabled us to replace our DT and Pottery classrooms over the summer break. The students are thoroughly enjoying the new learning environment- see pictures on page 32.

It has been an extraordinary privilege to witness the achievements of Moor House students in their artistic endeavours this term. The work of the Research and Training Institute continues at pace. The team have offered training to professionals both in the UK and overseas. Moor House published its first study on the effectiveness of intervention for college-aged students with language disorders. This is particularly important as there is very little evidence on the effectiveness of speech and language therapy intervention in students between the ages of 16-19. (See page 12)

As I finish writing this, I have just returned from Christmas lunch number two- once again Steve Manby and his team did an excellent job of providing a delicious Christmas lunch with all the trimmings. No mean feat when you have to do this on the scale required at Moor House, on two consecutive days! 
MHS&C - ONE OF ETON ACTION'S CHOSEN CHARITIES

RUN FROM THE SUN 2019



A 14 day human powered challenge

2019 was the year that Peter Irvine, and his friend Matthew Kirkby both turned 50. Both men had a desire to mark it with an event that not only challenged them but would also raise money for charity and involve their friends, to make it a real celebration.

Deciding on one of the designated a charities was easy as Peter's daughter, Sophie, has thrived at Moor House School & College.

Matthew has a house in the South of France and both enjoy cycling and are partial to the odd wine. Fuelled by a few glasses, they combined all of this and decided to become MAMILs (middle aged men in lycra) on a sponsored cycling event running through the various wine regions of France from Matthew's house in Le Rouret (just outside Nice) to Moor House in Surrey.

The fundraising target was set at £50,000 each for each of the two selected charities, Moor House and Macmillan, and corporate Sponsors were secured to get the ball rolling. A huge thank you to Rees Pollock Accountants, Ballistic Beer Company, Kigu Onesies, Nicky Thomas Photography, Ascent Experiences and Le bike Butler.

Money was to be raised by individual sponsorship and donations, a charity auction and forfeit activities and fines during the event (all in good taste and fun). The forfeit activities included a day cycling in animal onesies, some forfeit clothing and cycling up some of the Alps on bikes that were not fit for purpose. All forfeits were attempted in great humour and raised an additional £6,300. The final charity auction raised £12,000.

Peter admits that when embarking on organising this event, they did not really appreciate the scale of participation and interest, and hence the time and effort in the organisation. With over 70 participants, and in excess of eight crew, the event took 18 months to plan! With accommodation, celebration dinners, kit lists, mechanics and support crew, ferry crossings, route plans, event logos, websites, event branded kit, medals, insurance, airport transfers, corporate sponsorship, fund raising pages, social media pages, photographers and many more items, it become almost full time job for a number of people.

25 people set off on stage one with a couple of days ambling through the hill villages of Provence and the spectacular Gorges du Verdon. On day three the group took on the "Beast of Provence" aka Mont Ventoux and were rewarded a finishing dinner in Chateauneuf du Pape.

Stage 2 - "Pain is just French for Bread". This section was not for the faint-hearted! 17 cyclists set off on a 534km, 4 day journey from Chateauneuf du Pape to Beaune, which included 7851m of climbing.

The highest number of participants, unsurprisingly, took part in Stage 3. 44 members of the team spent 3 days going through the rolling countryside of Burgundy and the historic towns of eastern France such as Troyes, finishing in Champagne country with a dinner in the beautiful town of Epernay.

16 hard-core cyclists took part in the gruelling final leg, battling through high winds and relentless rain. An update from Julia let us know that in one day there had been seven punctures, 20 inner tubes, three tyres, two sets of gears, seven falls and a broken collar bone! This leg of the journey saw the cyclists visit three memorials for the battle of the Somme and lay a wreath. With three ex-servicemen in the group this proved to be a very moving and reflective part of the journey.

The final push took the group through the Downs and the Weald to arrive at Moor House where they were met with deafening cheers. Thank you to every student who cheered and clapped the final cyclists across the finish line with true Moor House enthusiasm. One team member told us, "The welcome at the school at the end was a hugely emotional and fitting finale which we will remember for a very long time."

The entire thing was finished with a wonderful dinner, auction and award presentation at a Kent vineyard.


Overall, with virtually all monies now in, including gift aid, the team have smashed their original target and raised £154,726 with over £70,000 for Moor House School & College! This money has been instrumental in funding the new DT and pottery building.

GUEST SPEAKER FROM THE BRECK FOUNDATION

On Friday 11th October the Breck Foundation came into deliver a training session on E-Safety and managing screen use at home. The story of Breck Bednar is a powerful one. Breck had been lured to his death by Lewis Daynes, an older boy he met on the Internet. Daynes, who had spent years grooming a group of boys via an online gaming server, gradually convinced Breck to listen to only him – and ignore the advice of his mother, who had grown so suspicious of Daynes' relationship with her son that she had gone to the police.

The Breck Foundation works tirelessly to educate schools, youth and their parents about online grooming and Internet safety, by teaching them that online is not real life. MHS&C have had the privilege of hosting The Breck Foundation previously and it was another succinct and informative workshop. Moor House CEOP Ambassadors teacher Matt Crowhurst and Residential Care Team Leader, Darren Heine were on board to talk to parents and carers about how to keep their children safe online.


After our picnic lunch in the foyer we tried on the Masks that we had made at school. They were masks of the dragon called ZOG.



YEAR 11 TRIP TO SEE WOMAN IN BLACK

MOOR HOUSE RESEARCH & TRAINING INSTITUTE

TES & OT Conference

We attended the Children's, Young People and Families RCOT Conference in September to talk to delegates about the WHEEL OF INDEPENDENCE™ Framework. The focus of the conference was 'learning through doing', so discussions on life skills and how our framework can be used to help young people learn to be more independent by taking part in different functional activities and skills, fitted into the conference very well. We received lots of positive comments on our easy-to-use tool and the benefits of the visual elements and reporting functions.

We also attended the TES SEN Show in October at the Business Design Centre. We spoke to a wide variety of professionals and parents about the SHAPE CODING™ system, the WHEEL OF INDEPENDENCE™ Framework, our bespoke training packages and Moor House School & College in general. This was a fantastic opportunity to network with organisations working with the similar client group and to learn about and share new ideas.





New Research Paper

Moor House has published its first study on the effectiveness of intervention for college-aged students aged 16-19 years with language disorders.

Little evidence exists for the effectiveness of intervention for older adolescents and young adults with language disorders, particularly for those over 16 years old.

The study, by Lisa Campbell and Hilary Nicoll, both Highly Specialist Speech and Language Therapists, and Dr Susan Ebbels, Director of Moor House Research and Training Institute, investigated progress in word finding following 1:1 semantic intervention with 25 college students (20 males and 5 females). It concluded that four hours of semantic intervention led to significantly greater gains on a standardised test of word finding than during a baseline period of equal length.

The findings show that intervention (at least for Word-Finding Difficulties) can be effective for college-aged students and therefore the effectiveness of Speech and Language Therapy services for this age group in a wider range of areas of language should also be investigated.

Colin Norgate has lived in Petersfield and worked in its surrounding villages for most of his life. He has been working in wood for about 35 years, from turning his first piece – a simple bud vase in beech, to the latest large furniture commissioned piece – a window seat with cupboards and bookcases in English oak and brown oak.

Colin's interest and passion for wood and trees came to him at an early age because of his loss his speech and comprehension of speech, due to his Landau Kleffner Syndrome. As a result Colin spent three years at Moor House School & College. Since leaving and becoming and incredibly talented furniture maker, Sculptural Turner and letter carver; Colin has returned to the Moor House's annual school fete to show his art and sell his wares.

For the last four years Colin has exhibited with Craft in Focus, to expose his designs and creations to a wider audience. RYAN'S FILM

A KALIFAGGKATHY PRODUCTION

'The Hidden Disorder' was a very challenging but rewarding film to produce. Talking about DLD and then sharing it with the world was scary, but I did it because I wanted to learn about myself and also to create something that would allow me a voice. I also wanted to give something back to Moor House for the help they have given me.

This film was created as part of my final dissertation in my last year at university. I wrote, produced, directed, shot and edited this film completely on my own. I felt that it was right for me to make this film on my own because I wanted to experience this journey of self discovery and acceptance for myself.

The inspiration of the film came from one documentary... a small American indie doc called 'The Way We Talk'. This was a film about a man who suffers with a stutter and he goes on a journey to learn how others cope with their own individual challenges. This film was raw and not at all glossy. It was an earthy story about his personal journey. This film motivated me to create and tell a story about myself with DLD. At first, I didn't want to make a film about DLD because it was too personal and I didn't want to be reminded of my difficulties, but after seeing 'The Way We Talk' it inspired me to make my film.

There were times during filming that were emotionally difficult to cover, such as the scene where I ask Lisa, (my speech therapist), What had I found difficult to do at school? I asked it unrehearsed to get her spontaneous reaction because she knew me well and has been with me almost all my time at Moor House and had seen me grow and develop from the age of 11 to a 19 year old. Her answer was honest and revealing but painful to hear.

After filming the documentary I started to edit the film, I think I made seven rough cuts (seven drafts of the film) to make sure the story worked in the way I wanted it to. It took lots of hours and many late nights to edit.

I suddenly hit a brick wall, how was I to end the film? I wanted to make sure the film ended on a high and strong note. So I reflected on my experience of filming and I asked myself what had I learned. Simply, I learned that it's ok to talk about my difficulties instead of running from it!

The film is out now and it has taught me to appreciate myself with this condition. It was an emotionally, exhausting journey but it was worth it.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD SAMARITANS PURSE



OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY WEEK 2019

School & College wore special t-shirts to raise awareness of Occupational Therapy Week (4-10 Nov). Run by the Royal College of Occupational Therapists (RCOT), the week is a national awareness campaign aimed at promoting the value of occupational therapists and the fantastic work that they do across the UK.

The Occupational Therapy team at Moor House

Moor House employs one of the largest onsite Occupational Therapy (OT) teams in the country within a school, providing over 220 hours of direct or group sessions to our students every week.

Our highly specialist team lead on a whole school approach, ensuring our students' sensory needs are met and integrated throughout the school day.

OTs work with students intensively in 1:1 sessions, small groups and directly in the classroom developing their motor, sensory and independence skills using a range of specialist approaches.

These approaches include the WHEEL OF INDEPENDENCE™ Framework; the COMPASS OF INDEPENDENCE ™ Framework and the Moor House School & College Independent Travel Pass system, which are used to deliver, track and measure students' skills.

In the last year, all our college students have shown progression on the WHEEL OF INDEPENDENCE™ Framework, maximising their independent living skills, whilst a significant number of our school and college students have progressed up at least one level of the Independent Travel Pass system, increasing their access to the community.

OT Team Leader for Key Stages 4 & 5, Milla Johnson said: "Occupational Therapy is a crucial part of the inter-disciplinary approach here at Moor House, supporting our students to achieve fantastic outcomes and that small changes have a big impact #SmallChangesBigImpact.

"Occupational Therapy Week is a great opportunity to raise awareness of the work we do and thank our dedicated team for the difference they make to our students lives."

MHS&C FAMILY RAISING DIABETES AWARENESS






On the 14th November we had an amazing turn out of staff dressed in blue to highlight the day and the cause.

Beauty's magical adventure, with her new friend the Beast, showed them that kindness and beauty are much more than skin deep.


The production was greatly enjoyed by all the students and staff.

8FG UPDATES



In DT we made a draw string bag. We sewed using a sewing machine.



8A have been studying the text 'The Iron Man' by Ted Hughes.

We have looked at different text types including letters, recipes and news reports. We also painted parts of his body to create our own life-size iron man with glowing red eyes, as big as headlights.

This model has helped us to create some great similes and descriptive sentences.

He is as enormous as the Eiffel tower He is bigger than a double decker bus His eyes are like glowing infrared headlights His head is like an upside-down bucket We have really enjoyed studying this text so far and we look forward to explore it more for the remainder of the autumn term.

The event was really well supported and was greatly enjoyed by all who attended.

















On the evening of Monday 30th September, some college students went to 'Jump In' in Tonbridge, to let off some steam and have some bouncing fun!


















LYDIA'S ILLUMINATED INSTALLATION

MOOR HOUSE COLLEGE PARENT INFORMATION SESSION

On Friday 1st November, the KS₅ Speech and Language Therapy team held our first parent workshop focusing on the extremely important topic of 'E-Safety and Social Media'. The workshop was hugely successful, with many parents attending across all college year groups. The topics covered within the workshop included the popularity of social media apps in 2019 such as 'Snapchat' Instagram' and 'TikTok', what the functions of these apps are, the positives alongside negatives of these apps and how to ensure our young people have the appropriate privacy settings.

Within the workshop we also discussed the meanings of current texting abbreviations, phrases and emoji's to ensure that parents can support their sons and daughters if they receive confusing or inappropriate content. The workshop also focused on how it can be extremely difficult for students with Language Disorder to interpret the inferred meanings from text messages, as they are not able to read facial expression, tone of voice or gesture when simply looking at writing on a screen. These miscommunications can often unfortunately lead to breakdowns in relationships, whereby a high level of support is required to repair these. We therefore discussed the importance of supporting our young people to understand the inferred meaning of these messages, which is something the KS5 therapy team also focus on teaching in our Speech and Language Therapy Groups. It was also a great opportunity for parents to share ideas on how we can support our young people to communicate through the use of technology, for example using 'audio messaging' and 'speech to text' apps. These methods are far more functional than writing messages, which can be extremely challenging for many of our students.

It was wonderful to have so many parents discussing such an important and relevant issue amongst our teenagers and young adults and we are thrilled to have received such positive feedback. The KS₅ Speech and Language Therapy team will be holding further workshops on a wide range of relevant topics, so please look out for email invitations in the near future.





ARTS AWARD BRONZE TRIP to ALL SAINTS CHURCH, TUDELEY

The Arts Award Bronze Level students had a trip to All Saint's Church in Tudeley to see the beautiful stained glass windows. The Church is the only church in the world that has all its windows in stained glass designed by Marc Chagall. The building has existed since the seventh century.

In 1963, Sir Henry and Lady D'Avigdor-Goldsmid commissioned a window to commemorate there daughter who had sadly passed away. The Russian-French artist Marc Chagall designed a stained glass window for the church which was installed in 1967. When Chagall arrived for the dedication of the east window, and saw the church for the first time, he decided to do them all! Over the next ten years Chagall designed the remaining eleven windows. The last windows were installed in 1985, just before Chagall's death.



While they were there our students made some lovely sketches of the glass work and took photographs of their favourite windows and the images within them. Their Art teacher was really impressed with their work and the dedication that they showed deciphering the stories by looking really carefully and analysing what they saw. 
I have been playing guitar quite some time now; which has been great. It is a way for me to relax.

We had 24 students who took part in the skating. Some of them visited the shop to have a festive and warming hot chocolate.
















MHC Parent 2nd Information Session -USING SOCIAL MEDIA: A PARENT'S GUIDE TO USING THE APPS.








FG worked with another student back in the kitchen and made a butternut squash soup with the squash from the farm.

At the end of the autumn term MHC held their Celebration Assembly.


There were many worthy winners and everyone shared in the celebrations and presentations with lots of enthusiasm and applause.


ELECTION DAY - MHC STUDENTS VOTE!




