Relationships and Sex Education (RSE)

As part of the normal curriculum entitlement, your child will have lessons on relationships and sex, during their PSHCE (Personal, Social, Health, Citizenship and Economic Education) lessons this term.

All PSHCE lessons at Moor House take place within the guidelines received from the Department for Education and the school's Sex and Relationships Education Policy, which has been approved by the governing body of the school.

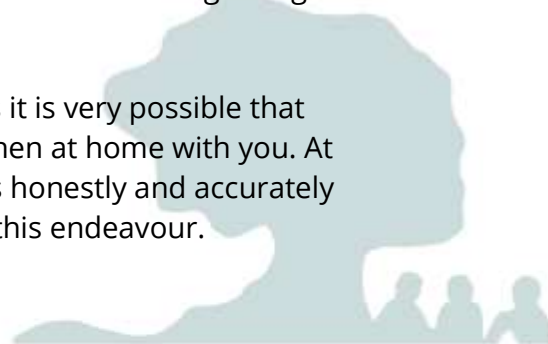
This term PSHCE lessons for year seven intend to cover:

- Friendship and friendship difficulties (including texting etiquette)
- Consent within friendships
- Romance and appropriate behaviours
- Labelling private body parts
- Puberty and how the body changes (including emotions)
- Appropriate and inappropriate touch (The 'PANTS' rule)
- Revising Year 6 learning

Some students may also explore: Where do babies come from and how are babies born. Please note that it is possible that further content may be discussed if raised by students.

RSE teaching will include both heterosexual and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGBT) relationships. Please see the PSHCE Curriculum Map (available on the school website) or contact your child's tutor if you would like further information regarding what will be taught.

Your support and co-operation will be greatly appreciated, as it is very possible that your child may discuss some of the issues raised at school when at home with you. At Moor House, we always aim to answer students' questions as honestly and accurately as possible; it is important that parents/carers support us in this endeavour.
